We spent time on Friday setting up three trailers that consisted of operator positions, crank up towers, assembling antennas (horizontal and vertical) and ground grids. Establishing generator power, solar power, and interconnecting the operator positions with computers and network cable. Canteen facilities for those participating and visiting were set up as well (thanks Jay). ALL these actions are necessary to practice should it ever be necessary to establish communications during a disaster or other emergency where amateur radio is called into service.

Field Day also provides us the opportunity to "strut our stuff" to the public. We get very few nationally promoted opportunities over the course of the year to show what amateur radio is about and get new folks involved. A sign-in sheet at our event listed 31 non-ham visitors to our site including the Mayor of Battle Creek. While our site is a wonderful radio-quiet location in Fort Custer, it was not a front and center location for visibility...yet more than 30 (and probably more including some Young Marines) came out to see what our hobby is about. Some visitors stopped by during set-up and some during operations. Several of us were able to escort these visitors around the site and explain what was going on and in some cases allow third-party operation. We have got to get these people hooked to keep our hobby alive!

The Fort Custer staff provided us with a great freshly mowed and level area to operate that included picnic tables and a rustic toilet as well as plenty of parking.

As many of you know, Terry (N8LN) and I teach a Tech level class from time to time. Coincidentally, our last class was in its final week when Field Day happened. Many of our students were able to make it out to see and hear what HF communication entails as well as other modes of operation. We talked a lot about this in class, but nothing beats hands-on. All were impressed with the time and commitment it took to get the trailers and towers set up.

By the way, congratulations to our newest Technicians: Mike Patzowsky KE8MOG, Bill Thick KE8MOH, Paul Crisher KE8MOI, Scott McDonald KE8MOJ, and Tim Yancer KE8MOK.

If you weren't able to come out this year, how about joining us next year even if contesting isn't your cup of tea. Maybe some other modes ARE of interest to you, like satellite operation or VHF/UHF. Make a proposal to the club, and set up a station. Or just come out to support the operation by setting up and tearing down, acting as an Ambassador, or just being a pretty face on the grounds! If the entry fee to Fort Custer is an issue next year (remember the Recreational Passport is good all year at all State Parks), perhaps we can make arrangements to shuttle between a parking lot off of Dickman Rd into the Rec Area.

The sign-in sheets and operator logs showed 23 hams at the site (not all were members) and from that number, 11 operated a station during the 24 hour event. Congratulations and THANKS to all that helped
