Ukraine Maintains Ham Radio Silence in State of Emergency

Radio amateurs in Ukraine appear to be diligently maintaining radio silence as the state of emergency declared there just prior to the Russian military invasion remains in effect. A February 24 decree from President Volodymyr Zelensky included "a ban on the operation of amateur radio transmitters for personal and collective use." The Ukraine Amateur Radio League (<u>UARL/LRU</u>) reported this past week that it has received many messages of encouragement from the worldwide amateur radio community.

"The LRU informed international amateur radio organizations about Russia's military invasion of Ukraine," said the message from UARL Vice President Anatoly Kirilenko, UT3UY. "To date, there have been many reports from radio amateurs around the world in support of Ukraine."

The International Amateur Radio Union (<u>IARU</u>) has adopted a neutral stance. "IARU is an apolitical organization focused on promoting and defending amateur radio and the amateur radio services," the IARU said. "The amateur radio service is about self-instruction in communications and friendship between people." IARU Region 1 has said it continues to monitor the development and expects all radio amateurs "to follow their national laws and regulations."

IARU Region 1 also re-posted part of an <u>advisory</u> from the Deutscher Amateur Radio Club (DARC) HF Committee on February 27. "Any radio amateur currently transmitting from Ukraine is risking his or her life. If you hear a Ukrainian station, do not broadcast its call sign, location, or frequency — whether on the band, in a cluster, or on social media. You may be putting lives at risk." The DARC's overarching advice: "In the current situation, the best we can do is listen."

Ukraine's assigned amateur radio call sign prefixes include EMA – EOZ and the more commonplace URA – UZZ. Some stations with Ukrainian call signs may still be active, because an exception to the amateur radio ban was made for stations in the Donbas region of eastern Ukraine (eastern Donetsk and Luhansk oblasts), which have special legal status owing to Russia's occupation since 2014.

In a Facebook <u>post</u>, Poland's IARU member-society PZK has offered available Winlink nodes in Poland for any licensed refugees. If you are a licensed amateur radio operator, you can send information by email to your relatives in Poland or Emergency Services via the <u>Winlink</u> system. Polish Winlink nodes are active on 160, 80, and 20 meters: SR5WLK, 3.5955 MHz USB; SR3WLK, 14.111 MHz USB, and SP3IEW, 1.865 MHz USB.

Province supports the New Westminster Amateur Radio Club

The New Westminster Amateur Radio Club is among the 250-plus notfor-profit organizations across B.C. that are receiving community gaming grants to support environmental conservation and public safety programs.

According to the <u>New Westminster Amateur Radio Club</u> website, the group was created to promote the hobby of amateur/ham radio and emergency communications. It has received an \$8,000 community gaming grant for emergency radio communications.

"The pandemic has reminded us how important it is to stay connected to our loved ones and communities," New Westminster MLA Jennifer Whiteside said in a news release. "In an emergency, the New Westminster Amateur Radio Club provides additional communications support, and I'm pleased that we are able to aid them their work."

The province is providing grants for public safety work, such as volunteer firefighting, marine and land search and rescue operations, crime reduction and restorative justice, and emergency response and communications.

Local organizations enrich our communities," said Richmond-Queensborough MLA Aman Singh. "From providing emergency services to teaching us about the environment, our government will be there to support these groups as we build a stronger B.C. for everyone."

According to the province, Community Gaming Grants provide \$140 million from gaming revenues annually to support nearly 5,000 not-for-profit organizations delivering services to people in B.C. communities. Organizations providing emergency and safety services are receiving approximately \$5.5 million to deliver their community-led programs.

COMMITTEE REPORTS:

- Hamfest Per Paul KE8MOI, we are all set for power. Set up will be for 156 tables and the setupis ADA compliant. One change from the 2019 Hamfest - the "nest" above the valley, previously used for the VE session, is no longer available. A different room with up to 20 seats has been set aside for the VE session. The lift will be available Friday, March 18th, to put the antenna on the roof for the talk-in. Cheryl at Wings said they'll put an ad for our Hamfest on their sign by I-94 in a couple of days.
 - On Friday, March 18th, Door # 17 will be used for vendor access. Paul will need to get ahold of Cheryl to have doors ready for the vendors on Saturday at 6 am. Door #17 will be open also on Saturday morning. We are allowed to leave 40 tables set up at the end of our Hamfest for the motorcycle group coming in next. At this time, CDC guidelines will need to be followed masks recommended, but not required. Paul spoke with Terry N8LN about the grand prize for the raffle. Terry suggested an Icom ID-52. Smokey has been spreading the word about our Hamfest on the various nets.
- Skywarn Per Smokey N5MKY, the Calhoun County Emergency Manager and 911 dispatch director presented at this past Tuesday's meeting. This weekend they have a MARS exercise. There will be a Webinar this evening at 8 pm. There was a discussion about discontinuing the use of warning sirens and using push alerts to cell phones and the media instead for emergency notifications. Indiana has already sent notifications for signing up for online Skywarn training. The Grand Rapids weather radar station is down for two weeks for maintenance.
- VE Session The next session will be Thursday,
 February 24. Kyle has heard from one person who

- may test at that time. Terry N8LN mentioned he and Mike KQ8N are talking about doing another HAM class.
- Repeaters Don W8RVT reported he hasn't been up there recently. He paid for the Magic Jack for this year (a donation from him to the club).
- Melanie asked about the charge for using repeaters on Federal Land. Per Smokey N5MKY, this will not pose a problem for Calhoun County as there are no repeaters on federal land. However, it will be an issue for the states out west.

OLD BUSINESS:

• Tom KE8GDN is trying to line up orientation/training sessions to have after our regular monthly club meetings. He will post information on our SMARS Facebook page. He is also looking for volunteers to lead training/orientation sessions or suggestions about future presentations. The goal is to make our meetings more interactive for attendees. John W8JRD mentioned the ARRL has representatives willing to come to club meetings to present about the ARRL. Per Paul, Don W8RVT has experience with satellite tracking, which would make for an interesting presentation/demonstration. Other ideas include a QSL card or contesting awards "show and tell" by members.

NEW BUSINESS:

• Paul KE8MOI would like to have our club operate a special event station. He asked for members' suggestions of any special event(s) at which we can set up a station and run a radio. One suggestion was to have a station at the Marshall fly-in at Brooks Field during the weekend of the Marshall Historic Home Tour. Ron K1RKD mentioned that HAMs can set up an antenna and radio at lighthouses to make contacts during the Lighthouses On The Air event. Paul would also like for our club to participate again with the local Boy Scout for the annual Jamboree (JOTA). Let's put our skills and equipment to use!
